

NEXT spring Cal will bestow degrees on its Class of 2020. Among those graduating will be a few students who have resided in Bowles Hall

Residential College all four of their years. Given the many times when the obstacles to this project seemed too great, I am very much looking forward to celebrating the milestone their graduation represents.

As you will read elsewhere in this newsletter, our fourth year of operation is going well. Thanks to our Principal Dennis Lieu, the residential staff, and our student leaders, our programs and events engage nearly all our residents.

This year our management company EdR was acquired by Greystar Real Estate Partners. The transition has had some usual challenges, some of which have been felt at the Hall. The Board is closely monitoring the quality of services delivered to residents, and the Executive Committee is working with Greystar to ensure that the Board's and residents' expectations are met.

Our Foundation Board of Directors continues to grow in the diversity of its perspectives and talents. In the past year we have elected to the Board the parent of a current resident, a first-year alumnus, and a previous program director of Cal Housing, and our leadership continues to

include faculty, senior members of the Cal administration, alumni and friends of BHRC. All told, the commitment and expertise of the BOD are a tremendous asset to the Foundation and its mission.

Special thanks are due John Baker, for many reasons. After several years overseeing the renovation and serving as Vice President, John stepped further as President. We are very fortunate that he remains on the Board and its Executive Committee as President Emeritus, focusing on our relationship with the Cal campus and other external stakeholders.

Most of all, I continue to be impressed with the enthusiasm and involvement of our residents. One way or another, every week I hear from them about program ideas, how/where they would like to get more involved, some facilities hiccup, etc. Many tell me that BHRC is a key part of their positive Cal experience, and their level of engagement confirms that. As we keep up our efforts to improve BHRC even further, the residents are very much partners in that work. For me, along with being a significant responsibility, that is a tremendous motivation and source of great fun. 🏰

Principal's Update

SUMMER this year at Bowles Hall was an extremely busy time as we welcomed a wide variety of international and domestic programs. The summer program participants included groups from the US, China, Japan,

Singapore, Hong Kong, Chile, Turkey, Egypt and Russia during various parts of the summer. At its peak, occupancy for a two-week period exceeded official capacity, and we had to convert a few of our double rooms into triples to accommodate the demand. The income from summer programs at Bowles Hall is a critical part of our business plan, helps to keep rents low for our residents during the regular academic year, and keeps our kitchen staff employed. Overall our summer residents were extremely enthusiastic, motivated, and well-behaved. We look forward to working with these programs next year.

Our regular residents returned for the Fall 2019 semester to a full house, i.e. every single bed was occupied. Here are some interesting statistics about our current residents:

- **109** are men and **79** are women
- **34** are entering freshmen
- The return rate for residents (eligible to return) is **80%**
- The acceptance rate for new resident offers is around **90%**

The Welcome Committee, organized by the Hall Association, was exceptional in greeting our new freshmen with a wide array of fun activities, trips, and survival information.

Residents returned to a couple of exciting changes for the coming year. First and foremost, we welcomed

Among the organized advising events so far this semester were a research internship panel, a panel on major field selection, a PATH to Care workshop, a professional development workshop, and a Women in the Workplace workshop. The Undergraduate Fellows have also been performing a superb job in keeping residents notified of upcoming academic deadlines and professional development events across campus. 🏰

Project Spotlight: Livening Up the Hall With Music

SINCE we moved into the new Bowles Hall in 2016, we have been dreaming about having some way to enjoy music across all of its beautiful spaces. That dream has now become a reality. Enabled by a generous donation from Kevin Kennedy, a Bowles parent and BHF board member, the hall now features 24 high quality Sonos speakers across all of its major common areas, including the: Newman Dining Commons, Matteson Lounge, Peirano Game Room, Front Courtyard, and Larson Back Patio. Residents enjoy effortless control of the system via 3 mounted iPads and a chatbot, all with access to 50+ million songs on Spotify. The Matteson Lounge in particular enjoys an upgrade: in one click, the lounge turns into a 150” home theater delivering rich surround sound.

Our earliest attempt at getting a system of this magnitude in the hall met a fairly disappointing end with a \$100k+ quote. We realized the only way to reasonably implement our vision was to do the installation work ourselves. Our original one week time estimate turned into a four month project, but we learned a ton about our unique building and were able to utilize the skillsets of different students in the hall, ranging from machining custom parts to digging trenches to lay underground wire. From light jazz

during early breakfast hours to hall-rocking bass during the Fall Soirée, we have been pleased to see the system being used on a daily basis. We hope that this project will serve as a template for future collaborations between students, parents, and alumni to keep improving Bowles Hall.

Regarding the project, Kevin Kennedy said, “I was blown away by how well-thought out the sound system proposal was. Not just all the work that had gone into its design but that George and Chanan were willing to do all of this highly technical installation work themselves. Their level of commitment to the Hall and their willingness to not only originate the idea and identify the needed equipment but also secure the funding and perform the installation was really inspirational. In my mind it represents the best of what a residential college should be. The students took ownership of an idea and found a way to make it a reality, all while leaving the Hall better for the next generation of students. I know there are other similar capital projects the students would like to pursue and hopefully we as a parent community can find a way to make those ideas a reality.” 🏰

Bowles Hall creates a home away from home for those students fortunate enough to live here. At Bowles, we are surrounded by familiar faces and have an built-in support system. On such a large and bureaucratic campus, a residential college provides the warmth and intimacy needed to thrive academically, emotionally, and professionally.

But affordability concerns have plagued us since Bowles' reopening. Currently, a spot in the Hall runs ~\$20K.

Although rent hovers just under that of the most expensive campus dorm room, opting instead for a fraternity, sorority, student cooperative or apartment housing can cut living costs in half—at least. Despite the allure of a lower financial burden, most students don't leave. The Bowles experience is one of a kind and many are willing to pay the premium.

Some of the students forced to prematurely leave are among the most active members of the Bowles community. They hold positions in the Hall Association, organize our parties,

plan our trips, and keep dinnertime conversations lively. They are our roommates, classmates, friends, and future colleagues.

We are not just losing our socio-economic diversity by driving away middle- and low-income students and impeding new ones from applying.

We are also shaving off central parts of our family. For most of us, the issue is deeply personal. We have all seen a friend leave or have had to consider

the possibility ourselves.

It is this issue the largest area of interest for the Hall Association. What we embark on

is a long road, and we know it. But the Hall Association is rising to the challenge and we are ready to put in the leg work with your support. In the coming months, we will continue to collaborate with the Board to roll out a campaign to raise capital for scholarship opportunities. If you want to help maintain the health of the Bowles community, please remember the penny-pinching days of college and consider supporting us with your donations. 🍷

In Memoriam: William Godward, July 14, 1913 - February 24, 2019

WILLIAM Godward, known to his many friends as Bill, passed away peacefully at his home in San Francisco on February 24th. He was 105 years old. He lived a full and accomplished life, always maintaining dignity, integrity, humility, a spirit of generosity, a sense of humor, and a deep desire to help others.



Bill was born in New Rockford, North Dakota on July 14, 1913 to William Alexander Godward and Mattie Caroline Young. When he was eight, his family moved to northern California, living in Alameda, Fort Bragg,

MacArthur, Mariposa, Sonoma, and finally Santa Rosa. It was in Mariposa as a teenager that he first discovered hiking in the Sierras, the beginning of his lifelong love of the mountains.

In 1934, Bill graduated Phi Beta Kappa from UC Berkeley with a degree in Economics. His greatest joy in college was the year he spent in Bowles Hall. He graduated from Boalt Hall (now Berkeley Law) in 1937 with an LLB and moved to Santa Rosa to begin practicing law with Barrett and McConnell.

In 1941, he moved to San Francisco and joined the Cooley law firm when it had only six attorneys. On December 7th, 1941, just after playing tennis near his family home in Santa Rosa, he learned of the Pearl Harbor attack. The next morning, he enlisted in the Navy. He became an intelligence officer and served in San Francisco, Hawaii, and the Philippines.

In 1945, Bill resumed his law practice, becoming a partner of the firm in 1947.

He relished working with his clients and had decades-long relationships with many of them. He served as managing partner of the firm for many years. He continued to go to the office until he was over 100 years old. For years, he delighted in greeting everyone who worked there by name and in his later years, lamented that he wasn't personally acquainted with the new people.

In addition to his work at the firm, Bill had an abiding love of music and in particular opera. He saw Rachmaninoff play at the Civic Auditorium in San Francisco as a young boy and never forgot it. In the 1960s, he served as a board member of the Chamber Music Society, then as board member and president of Spring Opera. In 1971, he joined the board of San Francisco Opera, serving as president from 1995-2002. He believed deeply in the need to reach new audiences and to support new composers.

Bill was married for forty-three years to Ann Chandler, who pre-deceased him in 1994. He is survived by his daughter, Jennifer Trainor, his son-in-law, Ned Trainor, and his grandchildren, Catherine, Margaret, and John Trainor.

A graveside service [was] held Monday, March 4th, at 11:30 a.m. at the Santa Rosa Memorial Park. A memorial celebration [followed] in San Francisco on Friday, March 22nd at 11:00 a.m. at the Episcopal Church of St. Mary the Virgin.

The family wishes to thank all those who have generously shared their memories of his remarkable life. Bill asked that any donations be directed to San Francisco Opera or the Bowles Hall Foundation. 🇺🇸


